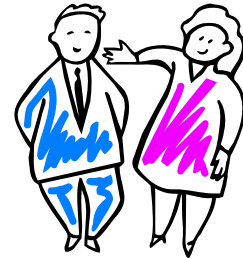

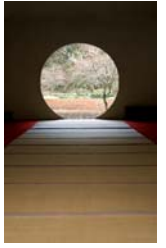

Minister's Message:

Newsletter article March 2013



Aloha! As I started composing this newsletter article the rain is pouring relentlessly outside, so heavily that it seems like a sheet of water is coming down from the skies over Makawao. It has been going on like this for the past 6-7 days already and it is the most rain I've seen in this island since I moved from Oahu last year. It was particularly very heavy one Thursday afternoon, the traffic on Makawao Avenue was crawling, areas of the town were flooded that portions of Makawao Avenue were closed to traffic in the late afternoon. The day started out like that, heavy rain in the morning but when I visited the children at the pre-school in Pukalani that same morning, it was only a slight drizzle. Amazing how the weather that morning was different from only 3 miles away!

The rain was so heavy that Thursday afternoon that 2 of the Japanese language students who did not have a ride to the classroom and umbrellas, came in soaking wet, but this did not seem to diminish their enthusiasm to come to the class. In fact, they seemed to enjoy playing even more in the pouring rain outside, after the class, despite my advice to them about catching cold from exposure to the cold rain. Those boys had a good time, but most everyone else suffered from the heavy rains. Streets got flooded and closed, accidents on the highways, cars slowed down, causing congestion and so on. One other thing I noticed was because of the heavy rain, streams of water started flowing from the kitchen area towards the front of the temple. Fascinated by the sight, I just stared at the small rivulets flowing steadily until I noticed something unusual floating in the water. At first, I thought they were small pieces of twigs and plant fibers but on closer inspection, they were earthworms, dozens of them, being washed away by the flowing water.

Apparently their burrows were submerged in rainwater and when they came up for air, were carried away by the stream of water. Some of the worms managed to crawl to dry ground on the parking space between the kitchen and the social hall, others were washed away as far as the nokotsudo area, no doubt ending up as bird food the next day, while those in the parking area were, I discovered later on, crushed and flattened by car tires. I saw also, a black cat caught in the downpour, soaking wet and running frantically for shelter towards the dana house.

Rain is a giver of life, providing much needed water for plants to grow and the plants get eaten by people and animals also. But rain in excess is a source of suffering not only for humans but for other life forms as well. We welcome rain in times of drought but curse it when it causes destruction due to flooding. However, the forces of nature are neither good nor bad, they are just as they are. The rain did not purposely fall to destroy the life of those earthworms, nor to cause suffering and discomfort to us humans and other animals and plants. It rained because there was just too much water vapor in the clouds that precipitated. The lower life forms that perished or suffered from the unusually heavy rainfall surely did not curse or complain, unlike some humans. They are incapable of making judgmental reasoning and perhaps just accept the destructive aspect of the forces of nature as part of the process of living. Human beings, on the other hand, live life as it suits their desires or egos. When things go our way, we call it good, but when things don't turn out the way we want them to, we call it misfortune or bad luck or unfairness in life. I am guilty of that a lot of times. Sometimes at the height of a severe gout attack, I would often say "why me?" Why don't the evildoers, those who use or sell drugs, the murderers, thieves and so on, have gout instead of me? I conveniently try to deny that my improper diet and lack of exercise are the major factors why I have the disease and not for the lack of morals.

Buddhism teaches the law of cause and effect. There is always a reason for everything that happens in the universe. Good deeds bring good results, bad deeds bring bad results. We are responsible for all our actions. Those whom I described earlier that do evil deeds will reap what they are sowing someday, but it is absurd to think that they would reap the results of what I had failed to do, that is, taking care of my own health. So, this past week of heavy rainfall did have something beneficial for me, as it reminded me of the fragile nature of life itself, and the reality that things happen because of causes and conditions that came about to produce results, good or bad.

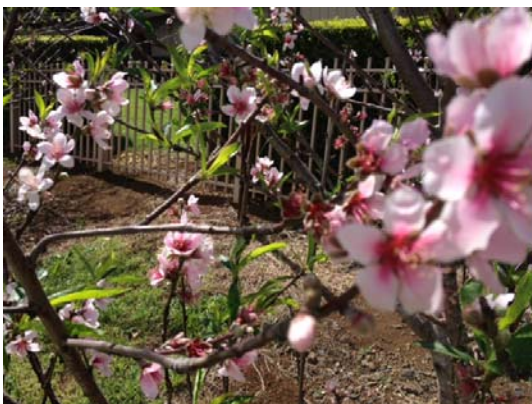

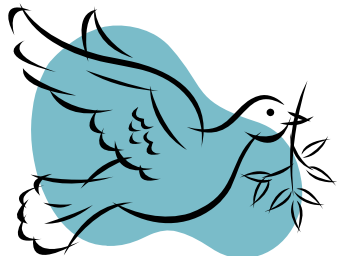

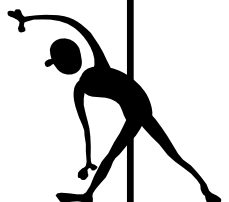
