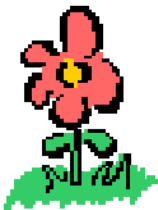
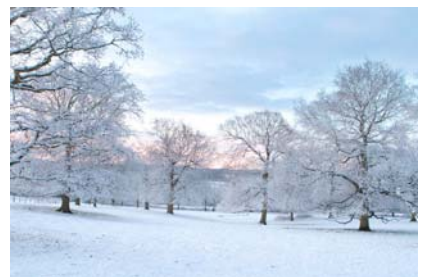

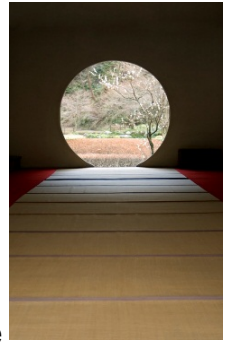
恭喜發財!

The above Chinese characters or kanji are read : Gung Hee Fat Choy, which is the Chinese greeting for new year. The Chinese new year is based on the Chinese lunar calendar so it is not the same as the western new year based on the Gregorian calendar that occurs at the end of December 31st. Because it is based on the lunar calendar, Chinese new year is also known as the Lunar New Year, and also referred to as the Spring Festival, the literal translation of the modern Chinese name.

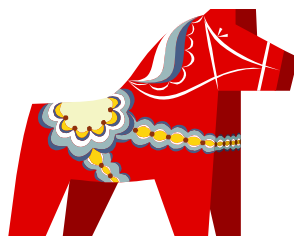
Spring Festival or Chinese Lunar New Year, whatever people in China prefer to call it, is the grandest and most important festival for Chinese people. It has its origin in ancestor worship in ancient China when people offered sacrifices to their ancestors in the last month of the lunar calendar. There is also the legend in Chinese folklore called the "guonian" meaning "passing a year". It is believed back then that the "nian" (年) or year was a strong, fierce and cruel monster that ate human beings. People were scared of it and had to hide in the evening when the "nian" came out. Later, people found out that the nian itself was very scared of the color red and firecrackers, and so the custom of using red color and setting off fireworks to scare away the monster nian became part of the Chinese celebration of the lunar new year.

We who live in the modern age may dismiss such beliefs as silly and unscientific, but for those who were living then, it was perhaps reality to them, although ungrounded in facts. Nobody in this age of science and reasoning would believe those old folklore and legends anymore but it worthwhile noting that some of the beliefs and superstitions of the old days fostered a lot of the festivals that people still enjoy today in this modern age. Was there really a monster called nian that ate people during the evening and is scared of firecrackers and the color red? Most likely, no, but Chinese people still celebrate their lunar new year with red banners, flags and so on and set off firecrackers with much joy and fanfare. Ancient folklores, superstitions and the many festivals that sprang out of them are an already inseparable part of the colorful tapestry of human history since the first human beings came into existence. Festivals, whatever origin they may be, are joyous occasions, most cultures spare no expense in the celebration of the festivals unique to them. There is usually an abundance of food, dancing, family reunions and people taking time off from work in the pursuit of a measure of happiness in their lives, for the duration of the festival being celebrated. What sets festivals and other major celebrations apart from just a regular personal time of celebration, such as a birthday or graduation, is the bigger number of people involved and this makes festivals much more fun and enjoyable. Happiness, joy, enjoyment seem to multiply in intensity as more people are involved or receive them. There is truth to the saying : "the more, the merrier.", more, being the number of people rather than the material quantity involved. Hence, during festivals people greet each other with best wishes and goodwill.

Buddhism teaches that the best kind of happiness is one that is shared with others. Shared happiness is double happiness. The Buddha Himself is quoted as saying that: "Thousands of candles can be lit from a single candle, and the life of the candle will not be shortened. Happiness never decreases by being shared." On the contrary, the more it is shared, the more it will increase, for the benefit of all. *Namu Amida Butsu!*

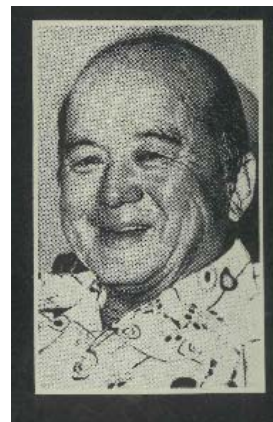

George Ito

A foster home for retarded children on Maui opened last year in Kahului and a similar facility is planned for adults. Both are the result of months of work by the Maui Association to Help Retarded Children and, in particular, by member and former president, George Ito

The two care centers a first for Maui, give new horizons to the mentally handicapped through professional care and programs and give a respite to their families.

"Mr. Ito has a very particular love for children and a special love for handicapped children," wrote the association member who nominated him.

"He tries to get everybody involved and really seems to believe that all of us should be involved in helping each other because we are all brothers and sister."

ITO'S RECORD of 40 years of service to his community bears out those words. He is chairman of the Maui United Way and an official of the March of Dimes Pacific district committee. He has served both organizations in various capacities for years.

He is one of the organizers of the annual Maui County Fair and his special interest is planning activities to involve children in the fun. Ito is a member of the Kahului Lions Club and is past district governor of the State organization.

He is active in the Boy Scouts and has been involved in organizing a variety of sports program, on Maui. He has served on a variety of committees and projects of Kahului PTA projects. Ito has devoted himself to hours of effort for children in spite of the fact that he and his wife are childless. He is an employee of the Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Co.

A plaque presented to George Ito states:

A lot of people in Hawaii appreciated their good neighbors. Many of those nominated for the annual Star-Bulletin Good Neighbor Awards were respected and loved for their helpfulness and kindness to the people in their neighborhoods. They truly are the basic ingredient that makes Hawaii a good place to live.

The awards judges applauded all 71 nominees in the competition. They picked the following five persons as winners because their neighborliness extends beyond the streets where they live. Rene Miyaguchi, 47, of Wahiawa. Mrs. Adeline Whisenand, 64 of Aina Haina. George Ito, of Kahului, Maui. Richard Spingola, 33, of Manoa. Robert E. Gibson, 78, of Wahiawa. They will be honored at a reception May 27 at the House of Janus.

Uncle George was 59 years old when he was presented with this award and passed away on April 19, 2007 at the age of 90. A substantial gift was received by Makawao Hongwanji from the George Ito Trust. His devotion to community continues posthumously.

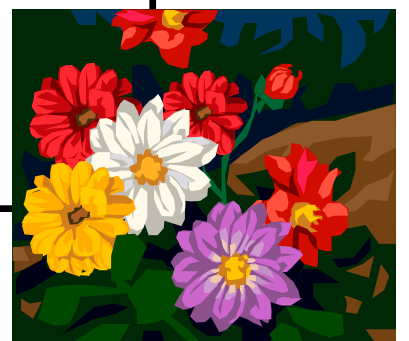
