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## AUTUMN OHIGAN SERVICE

“Higan” means “the other shore.” It is an abbreviation for “*to higan*” meaning “reaching the other shore (of nirvana).” Conducted during the vernal and autumnal equinoxes when days and nights are of equal length, it is a service of reflection when practitioners should meditate on the harmony of nature and devote themselves to the realization of this harmony in our inner lives. During the week-long observances, emphasis is placed on the Six Paramitas (precepts) which lead to the other shore.” Paramita is the Sanskrit for “gone to other shore.”

## My Little Amida: Melody

Mimy and I would like to thank the Sangha for being so kind to our grand-daughter Melody during the three weeks she stayed with us in Makawao.

As a city kid from Honolulu, Melody had a ball exploring upcountry Maui, playing with farm animals, including goats, chickens, turkeys, pigs, donkeys, birds, and playing ‘fetch the stick’ for the first time ever with Lily and Ziggy; eating fresh avocados and fruits every day; going fishing on the beach at Kanaha; and visiting the Maui Ocean Center.



Melody also very proudly ordered three kinds of the famous stick donuts from Komoda Bakery (she recommends the chocolate sprinkles).

Sadly, we did not have an encounter with the temple’s resident bunny but we’ll save that until next time.

Melody loved playing with the Maui Dharma School kids on Lanai—she’s so proud she’s been to Lanai but her parents have not!

Melody also went crazy at the Lahaina Obon, playing \$40 worth of kid’s games and dancing with big kids like Jamie (mahalo for being big sister!) and with slightly bigger kids like Rev. Hironaka’s youngest daughter, Minori.

I was honored to be guest speaker at Lahaina’s Hatsubon services, where I talked about the origins of Hawaii’s Obon traditions, including lanterns, bon dancing, and mountains of food, and the religious meaning of Obon in the Jōdo Shinshū tradition.

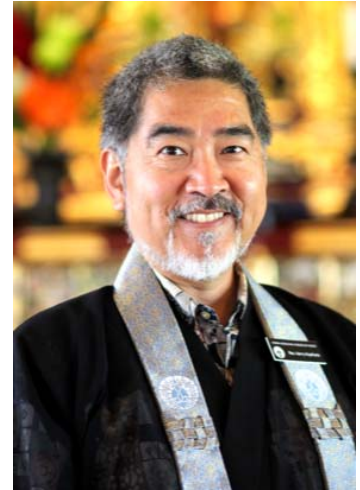
As the conclusion, I read Rennyō Shōnin’s Letter on White Ashes, which is a very profound *gobunsho* Letter that expresses the Truth of Impermanence, the deeper meaning of death, and the sadness of being the ones left behind. This *gobunsho* Letter is usually read at funerals and memorial services.

Imagine my surprise when Melody asked me to read her the Letter on White Ashes one night when she was trying to fall asleep.

**What kind of six-year-old wants to hear the Letter on White Ashes as a bedtime story!?** If that wasn’t enough, she then asked me to sing the Vandana Ti-Sarana as her lullaby! Melody likes the tonal changes in *buddham saranam gachami* (“I go to the Buddha for guidance”) and can sing it perfectly.

**What kind of six-year-old can sing praises of the Three Treasures in Pali, the language of the most sacred Buddhist texts?!** I often joke that Grandpa has a secret plan to turn Melody into a *Jōdo Shinshū Hongwanji-ha* priest and temple minister in Hawaii, and she’s well on her way, hahaha!

But, in reality, Melody is my Little Amida, teaching me, guiding me, and making me wake up to Great Compassion and Wisdom working in my life.

Our granddaughter is teaching me to pause and reflect upon all the precious gifts I have been given: Living in Makawao, serving as a Hongwanji priest and temple minister, being supported and encouraged by a kind and gentle Sangha of fellow travelers on the path of Nembutsu, and three weeks of fun shared with a granddaughter who is smart, funny, and cute!

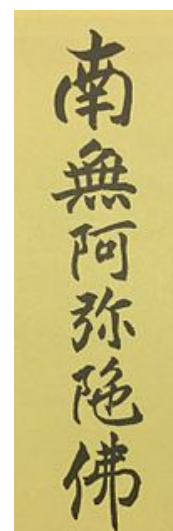

Mahalo to Melody for teaching Grandpa not to take for granted the preciousness of each moment in the time I have left before being born into the Pure Land, embraced by the love of family, community, and Sangha!

I put my palms together in *gasshō*, bow my head, and say *Namo Amida Butsu!* in profound gratitude to Amida Buddha for giving me the chance to be Melody's Grandpa in Makawao!

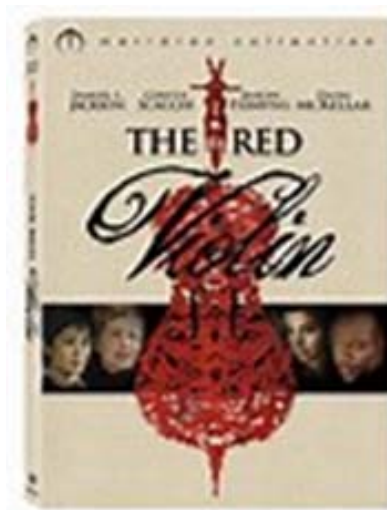

### **DORYOKU (Effort)**

"Doryoku" means to apply oneself diligently to a task, to exert oneself strenuously, to apply oneself vigorously.

In Buddhism, the Eightfold Path is set forth as the way of Enlightenment. The right way of seeing things, the right way of thinking about things, right conduct, right livelihood, right effort, right mindfulness, and right concentration are the eight correct ways of the Eightfold Path. And in regard to number six, right effort, it is expounded in the Funbetsushotai-kyo: "With regard to right effort, it is to address that which is right without any hesitation."

"That which is right" refers to that which is consistent with the concept of "dependent origination" (things coming into existence through their dependence on other things, pratityamutpada". Stated simply, the truth of dependent origination means that everyone is able to live through dependence on everyone else, and right effort is the kind of effort that is linked to the happiness of all those people around us who enable us to live.

To work only for the good of oneself while ignoring the inconvenience we cause to those around us who are helping us live is not the right kind of effort.

# MAKAWAO HONGWANJI BUDDHIST TEMPLE COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

August 18, 2018

**Correspondence:** Letter from Kahului Hongwanji Mission that President Michael Nishimoto resigned on August 5, 2018. Vice President Wayde Toyama is new president effective August 5, 2018.

**Treasurer's Report:** Fred Wong reported that interest payment has been sent for construction loan.

## **Unfinished Business:**

1. Long Range Ad Hoc: Report submitted.
2. Peach Lot Development: Report submitted.
3. C.O.R. Committee: Report submitted.
4. Commercial Use of Kitchen: St. Joseph Church April-May 2018. Under submitted Minister's Report, St. Joseph Church indicated they have liability insurance; certificate of insurance will name MHBT. They will also have certified food handlers present (no 3rd-party vendors). MHBT Properties Committee will meet to form a special committee to provide guidelines (agreements, etc.) and will report back to Council. Properties Committee will be overseeing this St. Joseph's Church project.
5. Suggested Revision of MHBT Brochure: Rev. Kerry also inquired about affiliate organizations' contact information. It was brought up that there is a binder in the Temple Office that provides that information.
6. Donations/Endowments: Policy Statement Draft V1.0 submitted. Rev. Kerry asking for Council to review for suggestions and revisions. Would like to finalize by next Council meeting. This information will be shared with Temple members.

## **New Business:**

1. Peace Day at Makawao Public Library in September: Rev. Kerry reported that Zenshin Daiko will perform and waiting to hear from koto performers. Origami crane folding will be done and the library will share the book about Sadako. Origami cranes that are already folded will be distributed as well.
2. Digitalization/Transliteration of Temple Death Registry and Buddhist Names Archives: Report submitted. Council in agreement to further pursue this project. Marilyn Morikawa will investigate if potential grant funding can be available for this project.

**Minister's Report:** Report submitted.

## **Affiliate Organizations:**

1. Dharma School: New school year starts September 16, 2018.
2. Jr. YBA: Maui United Jr's helped with MHBT Obon soda booth. August 24 will assist Hale Makua Kahului Obon.
3. Project Dana: Next meeting will be August 23, 2018.

## **Committee Reports:**

1. V.P. Activities: (a) Currently, New Year's Service scheduled for Sunday, December 30, 2018 at 9:00 a.m. Will there be additional service on December 31 (evening) as well as New Year's Day? (b) Hatsubon Service for 2019: Some members commented that they would like to continue to have services the same day as the Obon festivities.
2. Membership: 127 paid members (families) to date. Will put reminder in September newsletter as well as send reminder letters in October/November 2018.

**Other Business:** Council approved David Judd as designated driver for temple vehicle since he will be assisting with sale.
