

PICKLED PEACH FUNDRAISING UPDATE

This season's processing time lasted from April 15, 2015 through June 9, 2015 (about 8 weeks including preparing syrup before actual harvests. There were 6 harvest weekends and 6 batches to pickle and pack. A total of 876 gallons of peaches were processed. This total included peaches harvested and brought to the kitchen from the Fukuda, Nishida, and Nakamura farms.

This year, we had a really good turn out of members and friends including members from other temples and other religions and churches. We kept records this year of people helping and the hours put in. There was a total of 29 processing days and 856 estimated worker hours.

To share in a successful harvest this year, we offered the other Maui temples to buy from us at a discount so they can repack and sell at their Obon and garage sale/bazaars and make some profit. Please help them out by buying peaches at their events.

Although the harvesting and processing period is completed, the sales and distribution part is ongoing and will probably take us another 2 or 3 more months, if not more. Also the dried pickled peach processing of pitting, dehydrating, and packaging is ongoing as there are over 20 5-gallon pails still to be processed.

Members of the pickled peach fundraising committee for this year were Andy Hirose, Ray Nakagawa, Calvin Higuchi, Sharon Higuchi (dried pickled peaches), and Rie Taketa (orders/sales).

15th WORLD BUDDHIST WOMEN'S CONVENTION

Imagine, nearly 2,000 Buddhist Women in one place. It all happened in Calgary, Alberta, Canada on May 30-31, 2015. With the theme, "Embraced by the Oneness of Life", we indeed felt the bond as women and as Buddhists. Makawao Hongwanji was represented by Diane and Glenn Kosaka, Marilyn Morikawa, and Diane Nako. Joining the other Hawaii women, we couldn't be missed with our purple shirts and yellow lei. Other groups were from Buddhist Churches of America, Brazil, Canada and Japan. The Japan women were about ¾ of the group and some wore kimono.

Calgary is indeed beautiful with the backdrop of the Rocky Mountains and the flowing Bow River. The air seemed fresher and the land so spacious. On the way to Banff, we passed the site of the 1988 Winter Olympics and saw interesting buildings like the one owned by the biggest oil company of the region.

The keynote speakers, Rev, Nana Yanase, a fourth generation Japan minister who is a singer/songwriter, and Rev. Patricia Kanaya Usuki, a Canadian sansei whose first career was in the diplomatic services of the national government. Both spoke eloquently of how the Nembutsu affected their lives and through many causes and conditions they are able to serve as Jodo Shinshu ministers. In speaking of ONENESS, some thoughts presented were....

- Be mindful of our interconnections. All that we have are dependent on past and present conditions. It is astounding how many beings are in our lives. There is a constant flow of interdependence, for there is constant change and we depend on others.
- Life isn't as one planned. Work of Amida Buddha is part of our lives. We are empowered by the Nembutsu.

We attended workshops around the Eightfold Path themes: Right View was a performance by the Hiroshima Gagaku Club, Right Conduct was Qi Gong Moving Meditation, Right Mindfulness was Why Music? Music is a container of memories, Right Livelihood was Oneness: Success Through Interdependence, Right Effort was History of Buddhism in Canada, and Right Meditation was Naikan, a method of self-reflection. We will be happy to share more information if you are interested.

At the banquet, we were able to talk to other attendees from Japan and elsewhere. Many had attended the 2007 world convention in Honolulu.

The entertainment was the lovely Rev. Yanase singing her original songs, and high stepping dancing by Brazil, BCA, and Canada, Bon style dance by Japan and of course, hula by Hawaii. Did you know hula is popular in Japan?

More thoughts on ONENESS...

- The Oneness of life is that Life and Death are One. Support one another as we live together. Nothing lives forever, but our spiritual home remains.
- Every being is a teacher of life and a teacher of death. *Savor the moment for it will not return, but each moment affects all future happenings.
- Experience the warm compassion of Amida Buddha.
- To gain wisdom, one must observe.
- Everything is part of life, so live gratefully each unrepeatable day.

Four years hence, Aug. 30-Sept 1, 2019, the 16th World Convention will be in San Francisco, CA. Start making plans to attend. It will be another opportunity to feel the ONENESS as Buddhist women throughout the world.
