## GIRLS' DAY—March 3rd



**SPRING OHIGAN:** “Higan” means “the other shore.” It is an abbreviation for “to higan” meaning “reaching the other shore (of nirvana).” Conducted during the vernal and autumnal equinoxes when days and nights are of equal length, it is a service of reflection when practitioners should meditate on the harmony of nature and devote themselves to the realization of this harmony in our inner lives. During the week-long observances, emphasis is placed on observance of the Six Paramitas (precepts) which lead to “the other shore.” Paramita is the Sanskrit for “gone to other shore.”



## **MINISTER'S MESSAGE**

### ***Aloha and Mahalo***

First of all, I'd like to thank you for the wonderful welcome we received upon our arrival in Makawao as my wife, Kiyoko, and I begin this new adventure here. Everyone at the temple has been kind, helpful, and accommodating to make us feel at home.

My first week started off with a bang! I felt inundated initially in trying to be attentive to the many details of temple life. The family hoji (memorials), funerals, gatherings and meetings seemed to be filling each day. It was a totally different pace from the last four years of my retirement! Still the adjustment came relatively quickly even as I struggled with the important temple tasks such as setting the temple and Nokotsudo (columbarium) alarms!

So, now, in this third week, as our life settles down, we are enjoying each day even as we experience an unusual wave of cool weather on this upcountry slope of the Haleakala. We look forward each day with the Sangha marked by the Japanese Buddhist saying, "Ichinichi, ichinichi, kore kou jitsu" – Each and every day is a good day!

In this spirit, I wish to explore our mutual journey in the Nembutsu together. And although our Buddhist knowledge enhances our understanding of the teachings, history, culture, and practices of the Nembutsu way, I believe more fundamental is the expression of our entrusting heart and awareness of its truth and reality, spiritually, in our daily life. HOW we live each day in the Nembutsu as Namu Amida Butsu is as important as knowing WHAT Namu Amida Butsu means. This is the "talk story" which I wish us to share as your minister and especially as a fellow Nembutsu traveler.

For this reason, I've related the three kinds of Nembutsu, which I shared with you this past Sunday at our Dharma Family Service. They were quoted in a handout entitled, 'Shin Buddhism: Bits of Rubble Turn into Gold' given by my mentor and good Dharma friend the late Dr. Taitetsu Unno. He outlines the three kinds of Nembutsu in the following way:

"In Vietnam, people grow rice; in Cambodia, people watch rice growing; and in Lao, people listen to the rice growing."

Nembutsu as a means to an end (i.e. In Vietnam....)

Nembutsu as a process of self-awakening (i.e. in Cambodia...)

Nembutsu as a call from the compassionate Buddha (i.e. in Laos...)

Just as the people of Vietnam grow rice for nourishment, we recite Namu Amida Butsu to grow in and nourish our faith. And just as the people of Cambodia watch the rice grow to make sure each grain reaches its fullness, we recite Namu Amida Butsu as a process of self-awakening. And, finally, the people of Laos "listen to the rice growing" means they are one with the rice. When we recite Namu Amida Butsu with an entrusting heart, we are one with the compassionate Amida Buddha who calls us in the Name.

These three aspects of the Nembutsu give us a personal map of how to grow in awareness on our Nembutsu journey. They also open a way to engage in mutual conversation on how we live, process, and reflect on the unconditional affirmation of Amida Buddha's great wisdom and compassion. Ultimately, "each day and every day is a good day" conveys the fullness and depth of the meaning of the three kinds of Nembutsu.

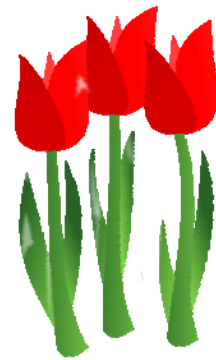
